The Trans-Am Series

In recognition of our partnership with SAH for the symposium, the videos for this newsletter concentrate on the Trans-Am road racing series in the United States, founded in 1966.

There's a period video about the 1969 Trans-Am series, featuring many of the great American drivers such as Parnelli Jones, Sam Posey and Mark Donoghue and cars such as the Ford Mustang, Chevrolet Camaro, AMC Javelin and Pontiac Firebird. This video has a very late-60s aesthetic.

The second video features a meeting held in 2013 at Watkins Glen and apart from the cars, one thing that caught my eye was the very relaxed driving style of Ken Epsman, driving an AMC Javelin number 2A. Check

out the in-car footage. It's a terrific sight to see so many great period cars being driven so hard. Here in Australia, our own historic racing is also immensely popular.

Ford Heritage Vault Website

Staying with an American theme, there's a link to a site established by Ford Motor Company called the Ford Heritage Vault. It contains more than 5,000 photographs and brochures on Ford and Lincoln vehicles.

From The President

Our Symposium draws near and there will be something for everyone with such a diverse range of topics. Please make some time to view the presentations.

Recently, the Shannon's Winter Auction closed with, for some, disappointing results. Has the significant rise in some sectors of the classic car market come to an end? Of note was the Holden Dealer Team XU-1 Torana driven by Brock and winner of the 1974 Australian Touring Car Championship. Touted at between \$900,000 – \$1,200,00 it failed to sell. This was despite some serious publicity on TV and radio. A friend's (ex GMH Design Staff) HQ Coupe in unrestored condition failed to get a bid with the guiding price set at \$120,000 – \$160,000. It sold post auction at \$85,700, well below this range but at perhaps a realistic price. Fords also sold well under expected prices, a '71 Fairlane at half the expected value, an XW GT passed in, as was a '68 Mustang Fastback. A '71 XY GT HO Falcon did sell at \$488,888 some \$200,000 below the expected price. There were bright spots, a 1990 VN Group A SS Commodore at \$10,500 over the guide value of \$140,000, an RX7 Series 2 Mazda Coupe up \$13,000 and a small Toyota Corolla Coupe from 1969 almost double the expected price of \$12,000.

On a different theme, it was pleasing to finally see a court case resolved after some 7 years. In 2015, I was asked for expert opinion on a 48-215 that was sold as one of the three American-built prototype Holdens. The car was clearly modified but due to delays, legal argument and Covid the trial did not take place until early August this year. A guilty verdict was pronounced after just over two weeks. This is the second recent success in a vehicle fraud case. Earlier in the year two men were convicted of modifying two SL Toranas into XU-1 Toranas and also rebirthing a stolen XU-1. This car did make the news as the young girl who originally lost the Pink XU-1 over 20 years ago got it back, fully restored. Its good to know the police will go the extra yards to convict those who defraud car enthusiasts.

Trans-Am Series Videos

The Trans-Am series was founded in 1966 and this video covering the 1969 season gives a real taste of the atmosphere. The Trans-Am series created interest in Australia because the races were run on "road circuits" like our race circuits, rather than oval tracks and cars were more akin to those in our popular production car races rather than American stock cars. The 1924 Rolls-Royce Twenty, chassis GRK81, pictured above has a body by the London company of Barker and was built to a French patent. On each front window frame is a plate inscribed 'Carrosserie Transformable' with the French Brevet Baehr, Patent No. 2312. The completed car was delivered to Motors Limited, the Adelaide Rolls-Royce agents, for John Reid in 1925. Reid was the principal of the firm of John Reid & Sons, tanners and leather merchants, who operated the Victoria Tannery at Hindmarsh, South Australia.

The patent was held by Gustave Baehr (1881-1954), a Parisian inventor and constructor of high-grade bodywork, and was amongst some 40 patents he filed in a number of countries, including Australia.

As Deborah has let us know, Warren & Brown held several patents in relation to auto tools and reconditioning equipment. They were best known as the inventors of the dual signal torque wrench but also produced valve reconditioning equipment. The breadth of the company's activities was staggering once I realised how much the company had done over its years. It no longer makes engine reconditioning equipment but continues to make torque wrenches in Australia. The company is now one of the main suppliers to Telstra and NBN Co. It supplies a storage management system for the country's fibre optic equipment.


